Hello fellow members. I am writing this message early because when most of you read it Leone and I will be in South Africa. We arrive back just two days before our August meeting.


So I am writing after a very social Probus week with the July meeting followed by the Coffee Morning followed by the Christmas in July lunch. A very happy and social week.






Members Spot

He left school grade 10 and completed apprenticeship to become a qualified fitter and turner.

He married his 1st wife and they had 2 daughters. He switched employment and became a storeman then a sales rep. He divorced his first wife and later met Gail on a blind date. They married and then started their own fastener business on the ground floor of their house in Ipswich. They ran that successfully for 19 years until the 2011 floods. They lost both their house and all the stock of the business. They tried to start up the business again but in 2019 they shut down and moved to the sunshine coast.





Our July Speaker:

Cheryl Ryan of 123 Travel gave a fascinating talk on her travels around the world and all her philanthropic efforts in helping young girls around the globe.

In Nepal she has worked with the Seven Women organization which was founded in 2006 to assist 7 disabled women. Since that time, it has empowered over 5000 marginalized women & children through skills training and education. They have now changed their name to Sungabha Nepal.

Cheryl also is involved with Days for Girls which works to help young girls and eliminate the stigma and limitations associated with the onset of menstruation.

She also helped raise funds for the School of Tim Harrington in Tanzania which is only available to the most underprivileged in the area around Arusha.

The students have free access to an education, healthcare, heathy food and positive adult role models.

Cheryl finished by showing photos of lots of the unusual places her and her family have travelled to.

Many of our members donated underwear and face washes for Cheryl to provide to Days for Girls which was much appreciated.



Members Travel Experiences

Our Balkans & Transylvania tour by Maureen and Brian Clark

Recently my wife Maureen and I went on the Travel Talk Splendours of Balkans and Transylvania Tour. We spent 17 days travelling through 8 different and thoroughly enjoyable countries.

We started the tour in Bucharest Romania which surprisingly is in the top 20 cities in Europe by population then travelled through Transylvania then back to Bucharest. We, along with our other travelling companions, had preconceived ideas that we would find lots of Roma people (Gypsies) and that the country would be a backward and undeveloped, almost a third world country. We found instead and thoroughly modern country with only a few gypsy settlements scattered over the country. The city of Sibiu, for example, in central Transylvania in the 13th century as well as in 2007 in conjunction with Luxemburg was acclaimed the cultural capital of Europe which showed just how advanced this area was and is now.

The history of Romania is fascinating having been ruled at various times by the Romans, Bulgarians, Hungarians, Ottomans, Austro-Hungarians and after the Second World War the Soviet Union. They are now and independent country and part of the EU and rapidly improving both financially and culturally.

Our tour then took us through Bulgaria, Serbia, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Croatia, Montenegro, Albania and North Macedonia. Whilst in Sarajevo we saw where Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and his wife were assassinated which due to the different alliances of the participants precipitated the start of World War 1.

The scenery was varied and stunning and the history was fascinating but unfortunately, they often have had wars between each other with the last being in the 1990's. The damage to the buildings is still evident to this day. Unfortunately, the world heritage listed Stari Most (Old Bridge) in Mostar was completely destroyed and as it had to be rebuilt exactly the same way it was built in the 1600's it took 5 years to rebuild.

We thoroughly enjoyed our trip and would encourage anyone who is interested in seeing somewhere different to visit this area.



The dealers gazed at each other, dumbfounded.


