






Friday 11th April - Golf Report

WATERFALLS TOUR

16 of our Probus members had an early start on Sunday morning and a beautiful day travelling south. Lunch was at Olivers near Maclean on the banks of the River Clarence, followed by a walk around Maclean. We then travelled via Coffs Harbour and Bellingen to "The Lodge" and the Three Blue Ducks Restaurant.

Monday, after a good breakfast at the Bellingen Butter Factory, we travelled up into the Great Dividing Range, along Waterfall Way through Dorrigo, stopping at the Dorrigo National Park and then some breath-taking Waterfalls, Dangar, Ebor and Wollomombi - Ebor Waterfall being the most spectacular. Our stop for the night was in Armidale.

Once again, another lovely morning and great anticipation of our stay at the Western Plains Zoo. This was more than we all had envisaged. Wonderful with the animals parading in the front of our Glamping Tents. At dinner our Entre included sliced Boar, Salt and Pepper Crocodile and Pork Sausage. The next morning was an early, chilly start, travelling in the Zoo Bus to watch the animals in the Savannah being fed and then to our delight we watched an Elephant having its morning bath and health check. What a beautiful sight, it was wonderful watching the animal enjoying the water and being scrubbed and how well it was trained and interacted with its keepers.

After a couple of relaxing hours, we went to the main Zoo, where some of us hired carts and others walked or ran to view the animals in their enclosures. What a great experience Later that afternoon we were taken in the Zoo Bus to be up close to the animals while they were feeding. Firstly, we enjoyed feeding the Giraffes, such big animals but very gentle when we offered them carrots. Unfortunately, this tour was cut short as we experienced a Queensland storm, thunder and lightning, heavy rain and hail.

On our last morning the 'Perrys' were late to the bus (Oh dear!) for our last visit to the Zoo. On arrival we all boarded the 'Caged' Bus to go into the Lion enclosure. It was a great experience to watch the younger Lions at play, one had a soccer ball, and the others were just 'play fighting'.

Finally, our visit to the Zoo came to an end and we were on the Bus travelling to Moree for our last dinner together, followed by another early morning travelling home.

Capably led by Andrew & Lynn to Dubbo and Back safely.

We left the coast at 7am under sunny skies of blue with 22 of us now on board we were off to Dubbo Zoo.

We took a coffee break in Yatala by passed Brisbane and the Gold Coast. Our next stop was McLean, where Scottish tartans adorn each light post.

This town on the clarence river settled in 1862 now has barrages to protect it when flood come surging through.

Once more on board our comfy coach the miles and time just fly. In Coffs banana growing farms are giving blueberry crops a try. We left the highway around 4pmto join the "waterfall way" Bellingen Lodge in the rolling hills was our luxury overnight stay.

We had happy hour at sunset with the Dorrigo plateau in view.

Then dined in the "3 blue Ducks". Lamb a popular choice from the menu.

DAY2

Ate at Bellingen butter factory where town history is preserved. Minor repairs on our coach gave time to wander the town and observe.

It was a winding climb up to Dorrigo passing landslides & towering trees to "Gandwana Land" and the skywalk after a talk and morning tea

While lunching at the Ebor Pub we heard local stories to enthral recent rains enhanced the view of Dangar and Ebor falls.

Spied our mystic mountains coach in cloud at the end of a road less travelled. Trod a mossy path to a wonderful view after a 10K drive on the gravel. Our last stop was a lookout in "John Oxley Wild River National Park" 1813 Explorer John Oxley surveyed this land said the plaque.

It was a tasty end to an active day as we dined on chicken and steak. Armidale Rydges had comfy bed with no reason to stay awake.

DAY3

In autumn colours tree lined streets glowed in the sun. An early fog had lifted to announce a sunny day to come,

Back roads led to a quaint old church which spoke of by-gone days. Now ivy clad, built in the 1800's it's still in use today.

From Dorrigo to Tamworth, we dropped down 1,200 metres. We left rainforest and ferns behind to find open plains the features.

With barley a 4-hour drive, we took back roads to "Black stump way" past painted silos in Dunnedo to a Zoo Welcome to end our day. Settled into our Zoofari Lodge tents we then met for the evening meal. Tastes of crocodile, wild boar & pork gave our dining an African feel.

DAY4

At 7 we boarded a zoo bus passing giraffe, zebra, ostrich and white rhino, Mel Grant, the keeper, who cares each day for Paponi the endangered black rhino.

Saw an elephant given it's daily scrub. To do this task takes 2. Carrots are given as small rewards with more food when the bath is through.

For the zoo tour some used 6 seat carts and followed a detailed map. The animals are calm in their open enclosures and this keeps the crowds coming back.

With a thunderstorm brewing we boarded a bus and fed carrots to the giraffe. Using their tongues they reached down to bite, while Jacob took photos-what a laugh.

With the carrots gone we showed empty hands and the giraffe all turned and ran. As raindrops fell, we ran too. To the bus when the storm began.

We rolled down the flaps as the rain poured down and sheltered beside the savannah. But when hail began, the tour was off! Well soon we were back for dinner.

DAY5

One more early start with the guide to hear of more animal ways then it was all aboard but the count was short.

Some will try every last thing to stay! The lion enclosure is well secured with close up viewing sections. We drove amongst the pride of the lions in a bus with great protection.

The Lions were relaxed, playing soccer or stalking behind a tree. It seemed like they weren't in a zoo but in their habitat, roaming free.

Fairwell Zoofari, farewell great staff, farewell western plains zoo.

We're driving north on our way home in the capable hands of Andrew.

We stopped to walk in Pillaga scrub, but little "Rock Art" could we see passing fields of cotton in the setting sun.

By 6 we were in Moree, had a short delay at the "Burke and Wills" for the motel had muddled Lynn's booking. Aromas of Roast rose from the kitchen helping us know what was cooking.

DAY 6

With a very long drive we left before 8. Some will doze a little, I think. Some farmers pay to support breast cancer wrapping their cotton in pink.
